When you visit to enjoy the tranquil landscape, magnificent trees and beautiful walks, have you ever stopped to consider the arboretum's wider impact?

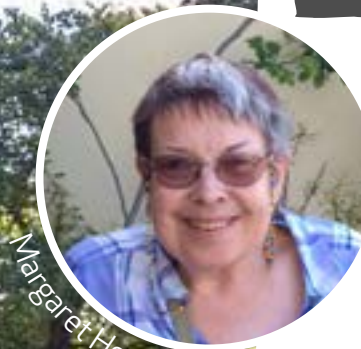

WHY WE NEED TREES

Trees are vital to our planet. They are the lungs of the Earth, providing oxygen and storing carbon. They are home to the world's wildlife, facilitating complex microhabitats.

They are providers of essential materials for tools and shelter. They strengthen communities, actively contributing to better physical and mental health.

They help prevent flooding and soil erosion, improve air quality and contribute to climate control.

They are the longest living species on Earth, providing a link with our past and a connection to our future.

However, our precious trees are threatened, at risk from climate change, disease and urban development. More than ever, we need to ensure that trees are valued and protected.

Over 9000 tree species, **16% of the planet's trees**, are threatened with extinction

GIFTS IN WILLS CAN MAKE A REAL DIFFERENCE

As a charity, Friends of Westonbirt Arboretum relies entirely on income from gifts and membership donations.

Our vision is of a long and sustainable future for Westonbirt Arboretum, for the good of the environment and people. If you believe in this vision, one of the greatest contributions you can make is a gift in your Will, protecting the arboretum for generations to come.

We continue to care for over 15,000 trees and 600 acres of woodland. We fund the recruitment and support of over 260 volunteers. We fund developments and activities for over 500,000 visitors each year. We support environmental conservation and programmes to help people experiencing disadvantage to get outdoors.

SAFEGUARDING SPECIES

FOR A SUSTAINABLE FUTURE

Westonbirt Arboretum's experts work with partners across the globe to extensively research and collect seeds from warmer climates.

They then bring them home to test how they'll perform in the UK. We are working to combat the depletion of woodland coverage, as native species die out due to increasing threats from climate, pests, disease and deforestation.

Our experts work to propagate these new specimens, caring for them in Westonbirt's glasshouses before planting them out in the wider arboretum where they can be monitored.

With certain species taking hundreds of years to mature, it's vital that we act now to conduct this essential research.

We also contribute to the Millennium Seedbank Partnership, coordinated by Kew Gardens. This provides a safety net against any species' extinction in the wild.

CONSERVING PRECIOUS

FLORA & FAUNA

Westonbirt Arboretum is home to at least 236 different plant species – around 8.1% of all UK flora! But in recent decades, this type of limestone grassland has been in rapid decline.

At Westonbirt, we're striving to reverse this trend. Our restored downland continues to be monitored each year and is an important Biodiversity Action Plan habitat.

This precious grassland provides a home for hundreds of species, including 267 types of butterfly and moth. At least 29 bird species also call the arboretum their home, which will be no surprise to those who visit early on a summer morning to experience the orchestra of birdsong.

The arboretum is an important location for various rare and endangered species, such as the garden tiger moth whose numbers have declined by 90% in the last 30 years, and the downland villa bee-fly which until recently was considered almost extinct in the UK.

LOOKING TO THE FUTURE

At Westonbirt Arboretum, we are continually striving to ensure nature is accessible to all. Projects such as the STIHL Treetop Walkway are helping to inspire the next generation, and they're only the beginning...

Increasingly, families are choosing to spend their days out at the arboretum, ensuring that children have the chance to be inspired by the natural world. We are leading the way for the next generation of botanists, arborists and environmentally responsible citizens.

We continue to fund projects that mean limited mobility is never a barrier to visiting, with hard paths, mobility scooters and a shuttle buggy enhancing the arboretum's accessibility.

We are always working on new developments that will educate, engage and enhance the visitor experience. We are incredibly grateful for the support of our members and donors, who help us on our ongoing journey to connect people with trees.

SUPPORTING OUR COMMUNITY

Increasingly, research is proving the huge benefits that getting out into the woods can have for people's wellbeing.

Since 2013 we have been running community programmes to help the more vulnerable members of our community to connect with nature.

From bushcraft skills with youth groups, to natural arts and craft projects with disadvantaged adults, these sessions have facilitated environments of belonging, equality and learning.

Now, with several years' experience delivering sessions that promote wellbeing, confidence and quality of life, we are continuing to champion the importance of engaging harder-to-reach community groups.

Not only are we continuing the programme at Westonbirt, but creating resources that inspire and support other organisations to develop similar projects.
